

- Published in *Strand Magazine* in September, 1904
- Published in *Collier's Weekly* on 31 December 1904
- Los Angeles Times > 30th April 1905
- San Francisco Call > 21 May 1905
- *Le Journal* > 21-25th August 1905
 - Translated as *L'Aventure de l'abbaye de Grange*
- Шесть Наполеоновъ > late 1905
 - Translated as Красный Шнурокъ (The Red Lace)
- *L'Abbaye de Grange >* late 1906
- Les Premiers exploits de Sherlock Holmes > 1909
- Included in <u>The Return of Sherlock Holmes</u>
 - Released in New York in February, 1905
 - Released in London on 7th March 1095



Logistics and Characters

Chronology: January 1897 or December 1897?

- Return: "...towards the end of the winter of '97"
- Original manuscript and Collier's: "...towards the end of '97"

Characters

- Holmes and Watson
- Inspector Stanley Hopkins
 - Also in The Golden Pince-Nez, Black Peter, and The Missing Three-Quarter (3-4 more?)
- Sir Eustace Brackenstall, one of the richest men in Kent ("Heppenstall" in the manuscript)
- Lady Brackenstall (Mary Frasier from Adelaide)
- Theresa Wright, Lady Brackenstall's loyal maid
- Captain Jack Crocker of the *Rock of Gibralter*
 - "Croker" in the original manuscript; "Crocker" only in the American versions



Geography: Abbey Grange, Marsham, Kent

- Kent was "Chislehurst" in the original manuscript
- Abbey *Wood* is a hamlet near Chislehurst
- Marsham is a village in Norfolk
- Marsham is . . . St. Mary Cray?






Beeswing

- "Bee's-wing" (or "bees'-wing") rather than "bee-swing"
- A filmy, translucent crust that forms on port wine and occasionally in older bottle-aged wines
- It appears as a light, flaky, or filmy crust on the inside of the bottle
- Potassium bitartrate forms when tartaric acid reacts with potassium; both occur naturally in grapes
- Harmless to drink, doesn't affect the taste
- When dried, it's known as *cream of tartar*. Uses include:
 - Stabilizing egg whites, whipped cream, meringues, soufflés, and more
 - As a mordant in textile dyeing, and as a reducer of chromium trioxide in mordants for wool
 - As a metal processing agent that prevents oxidation
 - As a cleaning agent when mixed with a weak acid such as vinegar







"Multiplex" Knives

1880s

The Swiss Army ordered development of a versatile, multi-functional pocket knife

1884

Karl Elsener opened a cutlery workshop in Ibach, Switzerland. His mother Victoria actively supported him.

1891

Elsener won a contract to make the "Soldier's Knife" (Modell 1890)

1897


The "Original Swiss Officer's and Sports Knife" was patented, becoming the basis for the modern Swiss Army knife.

1909

Elsener chose his mother's name, Victoria, as the brand name, and registered the Cross&Shield emblem as a trademark.

1921

The invention of stainless steel (Inox) led to the creation of the company and brand name Victorinox, combining "Inox" and "Victoria".





1905 Catalog from Whiton Hardware in Seattle


